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# Monitoring work increases in 2015-16

The number of programmes we assessed increased significantly due to sector developments and the increased number of approved programmes overall.






#### More collaboration

14% of approval visits were to programmes delivered by organisations working in partnership. There were no programmes like this in 2014–15.

## Responding to new and revised standards

We saw a 26% rise in programmes that needed to provide further evidence. In most cases this was to show how they meet the new service user and carer standard or revised standards of proficiency.





#### Adapting to new funding models

33% of programmes that will be affected by reforms to NHS bursary funding made major changes.

### Looking ahead

With the number of programmes expected to stay stable, our activity is unlikely to rise dramatically in 2016–17.
